Counties.—Table 3 shows the population of the 67 counties in Florida from 1890 to 1930, together with the land area of each county and its population per square mile in 1930. Of these counties, 13 were organized between 1920 and 1930. There are 40 counties the boundaries of which have remained unchanged since 1920. Of these, 35 increased in population between 1920 and 1930, while 5 show a decrease.
