### **National Health Interview Survey**

- Conducted by: CDC's National Center for Health Statistics
- Purpose: To monitor the health of the US population through the collection and analysis of data on a broad range of health topics
- Sample: Multi-stage, clustered national sample of housing units from every state, to be representative of the civilian noninstitutionalized US population
- Mode: In-person interviews by Census interviewers
- Data collection: Continuous, with annual data files
- □ Goal: Complete interviews for 35,000+ households


## General Approach to NHIS Insurance Content Since 1997

- Ask whether anyone in the family has health insurance coverage
- Ask about the sources of coverage for each family member
- Ask detailed questions about each type of coverage
- Collect the complete names of private and public plans, from the health plan card, if possible
- Confirm no coverage and ask follow-up questions for those said to be uninsured
- Identify inconsistencies and correct errors

### Strengths of the NHIS Health Insurance Data

- Collected in the context of data on health conditions, illness, disability, health care use, preventive health screenings, affordability of care, etc.
- Historical data to evaluate changes in coverage, measured at the time of the survey using the same general approach since 1997
- Collection of information to help verify public and private coverage, including exchange-based coverage
- Sufficient sample sizes to permit annual coverage estimates for all states in 2014

## National Health Interview Survey (NHIS) Early Release (ER) Program

- NHIS is conducted throughout the year based on monthly random samples.
- Annual files released six months after the completion of data collection.
- Early Release Products are developed prior to final processing and weighting to provide early access to the most recent information.
- **■** Every three months, the ER Program produces:
  - A report on 15 key health indicators
  - A report on health insurance coverage
  - Web tables with quarterly health insurance estimates
  - Preliminary microdata file used for these reports

## Early Release Health Insurance Estimates Represent an Average Over the Months Included

- September release has been based on answers collected between January through March
- December release has been based on January–June
- March release has been based on January–September
- June release has been based on January–December

December 2014: Estimates from NHIS Jan – Jun 2014

June 2015: Estimates from NHIS Jan – Dec 2014

September 2014: Estimates from NHIS Jan – Mar 2014 March 2015: Estimates from NHIS Jan – Sept 2014

#### **Early Release Health Insurance Estimates and** Data Files Will Be Released One Month Earlier

- August release was based on answers collected between January through March
- November release will be based on January–June
- February release will be based on January–September
- May release will be based on January-December

### Introduction

This report from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) National Center for Health Statistics (NCHS) presents selected estimates of health insurance coverage for the civilian noninstitutionalized U.S. population based on data from the January-March 2015 National Health Interview Survey (NHIS), along with comparable estimates from the 2010-2014 NHIS. Estimates for 2015 are based on data for 26,121

Three estimates of lack of health insurance coverage are provided: (a) uninsured at the time of interview, (b) uninsured at least part of the year prior to interview (which includes

persons uninsured for more than and (c) uninsured for more than the time of interview. Estimates and private coverage, coverage exchanges, and enrollment in deductible health plans (HDE consumer directed health pla are also presented. 
The number of uninsured persons continued to decline from 2013. In the first 3 months of 2015, 29 million persons of all ages (9.2%) were uninsured at the time of interview, 7 million fewer persons than in 2014.

Among adults aged 18-64, the percentage uninsured decreased from 16.3% in 2014 to 13.0% in the first 3 months of 2015. There was a corresponding increase in private coverage, from 67,3% to 70,4%


Among children under age 18 years, the percentage with private coverage increased from 52.6% in 2013 to 56.3% in the first 3 months of 2015, reversing a 14-year trend of declining rates of private coverage.

Among those under age 65, the percentage with private coverage through the Health Insurance Marketplace or state-based ingressed from 2.5% (6.7 anths of 2014




## Percentages of persons of all ages without health insurance using three measures of uninsurance: United States, 2013–March 2015





## Percentage of adults aged 18–64 who were uninsured at the time of interview, by age group: United States, 2010–March 2015





## Percentage of adults aged 18–64 who were uninsured at the time of interview, by poverty status: United States, 2010–March 2015





## Percentage of adults aged 18–64 who were uninsured at the time of interview, by race and ethnicity: United States, 2010–March 2015





## Percentage of adults aged 18–64 who were uninsured or had private or public coverage at the time of interview: United States, 1997–March 2015





# Additional Content of Health Insurance Early Release Report

- Percentages of persons in high-deductible health plans
  - Without a health savings account
  - In a consumer directed health plan
- Subnational coverage estimates
  - By expanded regions (9 similar to Census divisions)
  - By state Medicaid expansion status
  - By state Health Insurance Marketplace type
  - By selected states (in November, February, and May reports)

# Early Release Health Insurance Estimates are Preliminary

- Based on a streamlined version of final processing procedures.
  - More automated
  - Based on the prior year's list of health insurance plan names (list was updated with latest exchange plans for August release)
  - Does not distinguish between individual types of public programs
- Preliminary estimates are generally close to the final estimates.
  - Within 0.1 percentage points for the proportion uninsured
  - Within 0.2 or 0.3 percentage points for estimates of private and public coverage

- September 1, 2015 Early release of key health indicators, based on data from Jan–Mar 2015
- September 16, 2015 Updated comparison of NHIS and CPS point-in-time estimates
- November 2015 Early release of health insurance coverage estimates, based on data from Jan–Jun 2015

#### Comparison of the Prevalence of Uninsured Persons From the National Health Interview Survey and the Current Population Survey, 2014 and 2015

The table below provides a side-by-side comparison of recent estimates of uninsurance from the National Center for Health Statistics' National Health Interview Survey (NHIS) and the U.S. Census Bureau's Current Population Survey (CPS). These two surveys are pillars of the federal statistical community's measurement approach to health insurance coverage. However, the 2014 CPS was the first time that the Census Bureau had been able to use that survey to produce estimates of the percentage of persons who lacked health insurance coverage at the time of survey interview. In previous years, CPS produced estimates only of the percentage of persons who lacked health insurance coverage for the entire preceding calendar year. The table below includes the recently released estimates based on 2015 data as well as the previously released estimates based on 2014 data.

Although both NHIS and CPS now measure similar concepts, differences in survey data collection methods and time periods, sampling error, nonresponse, and data processing lead to minor differences in estimates. 


