2020 Census highlights

- Mandated by Article 1, Section 2 of the U.S. Constitution, the census determines congressional representation and is used for state and local redistricting
- Census Day is April 1, 2020
- The census is the nation's largest peacetime mobilization
- Respondent information is strictly confidential by law
- Census data will help direct more than \$675 billion annually in federal funding
- Census data is used by businesses, governments, and civic organizations to inform decision-making






How we conduct the census



2020 Census environment

The 2020 Census will be conducted in a rapidly changing environment, requiring a flexible design that takes advantage of new technologies and data sources while minimizing risk to ensure a high quality population count.





2020 Census responses are confidential

- Responses to the 2020 Census are confidential and cannot be shared with immigration or law enforcement agencies
- Census Bureau employees take a lifetime oath to protect the personal information of every respondent
- Any Census Bureau employee that violates this law is subject to a penalty of up to \$250,000 and/or up to 5 years in prison

Additional language support for the 2020 Census

Beyond online and phone response in the 12 non-English languages:

- Print and video language guides available online in 59 non-English languages
- Language glossaries for the 59 non-English languages provide key terminology to bilingual staff
- Partnership specialists will be hired from within local communities, emphasizing the importance of communicating in local languages.







Spanish Support for the 2020 Census

All households will have the option to respond in Spanish online or by phone.



Households will receive an invitation to participate in the census. The invitation will include instructions in Spanish for how to respond in Spanish online or by phone using a direct toll-free line in Spanish.



All households that have not yet responded by mid-April will receive a paper questionnaire.



Households in select areas needing Spanish assistance will receive an English/Spanish bilingual questionnaire.



About 13 million households across the nation (roughly 9%) will receive bilingual English/Spanish invitations.





What to expect in the mail

March 12-20	An invitation to respond online to the 2020 Census. (Some households will also receive paper questionnaires.)
March 16-24	A reminder letter.
	If you haven't responded yet:
March 26-April 3	A reminder postcard.
April 8-16	A reminder letter and paper questionnaire.
April 20-27	A final reminder postcard before we follow up in person.

Every household will have the option of responding online, by phone, or by mail.

Every household that hasn't already responded will receive reminders and a paper questionnaire.

Collect data from all households, including group and unique living arrangements

Field workers will use handheld devices for collecting the data

Information the media can share

What is the census?

The census is a complete count of everyone living in the United States that only happens once every 10 years.

What questions will I be asked?

The census asks questions such as age, sex, race, and the number of people living in your home regardless of country of origin, nationality, or immigration status.

How can I participate?

Respond online, by phone, or by mail. If you do not respond, a census taker will come to your home to help you respond.













Information the media can share

How will the census help me?

Census data helps inform decisions on how public funds are spent for schools, fire and emergency services, roads and bridges, health clinics and hospitals, and more in your community.





Who should be counted?

- Everyone who lives in the home or sleeps there most of the time (even if they are not relatives)
- Children
- Grandparents
- Newborn babies
- Documented and undocumented individuals





Responses to the 2020 Census are confidential and protected by law.









Ways the media can help the census

- Share the benefits census data provides to your local community
- Let people know about all three modes of response (online, phone, mail)
- Clarify census responses are safe and confidential
- Explain the consequences of an inaccurate census count, and focus on an area that is important to your audience (e.g., health services or schools)
- Describe how census data is collected and used
- Use census data to help support any story you're working on when relevant





Paid media campaign phases and timeline

1

Phase 1: Awareness*

January 12 through March 12, 2020**

Bring attention that the 2020 Census is approaching and educate.

Keep the 2020 Census top of mind.

2

Phase 2: Motivation

March 13 through May 12, 2020 (Census Day is April 1, 2020)

Drive participation and action to encourage 2020 Census survey completes.

3

Phase 3: Reminder

May 13 through July 31, 2020

Remind people of the deadlines to drive non-responder survey completes.

Inform people of census takers for cooperation prior to when they will come to their door.

4

Phase 4: Thank You

September 2020 - Beyond

Inform the public that the 2020 Census is now complete and educate where census results can be found (private information will not be shared).






