



2022 Economic Census

- Conducted every 5 years, the economic census produces the most comprehensive economic data available.
- Serves as the benchmark for more frequently occurring Census Bureau economic surveys.
- Businesses reported their 2022 year-end numbers. Responses are strictly confidential.
 Company data is used for statistical purposes only.



2022 Economic Census

- Data covers 19 economic sectors that encompass 950 NAICS industries, that span over 21,000 geographic areas.
- Release schedule: January 2024 March 2026
- All data are free and available online

Information Required


- The Economic Census asks for the following information for each business location:
 - Employer Identification Number
 - Physical location
 - Primary business activity
 - Sales, receipts, or revenue
 - Employment and payroll
 - Industry-specific questions





Note: Most companies did not receive the **Economic Census**

- Only businesses with employees, and
- Only a sample of smaller businesses are required to respond.





2023 Research Findings

- Survey respondents simply want to know that the information they provide is being used and that Census data exist – they will likely just glance at data shown in the ads.
- But data users are more likely to scrutinize the charts and data presented and think through how they would actually use them for decision making.
 - They are looking to "connect the dots" from the statistics shown in the ad to use case.
- There is need for more detailed data and stronger alignment with case examples in next-round Data Story ads.

\$1,436 Annual spending per household on women's apparel (2021)





Annual Integrated Economic Survey (AIES)

Streamlined design that integrates and replaces seven existing annual business surveys into ONE single survey.

WHAT IS THE ANNUAL INTEGRATED **ECONOMIC SURVEY (AIES)?**

The AIES is a single streamlined survey that provides the U.S. government's official annual measure of American businesses and economy.

WHEN WILL THE AIES TAKE PLACE?

Businesses will begin receiving invitations to complete the AIES in the spring of 2024.

WHICH BUSINESSES ARE COVERED IN THE AIES?

A sample of companies with one or more operating locations in the United States or the District of Columbia (D.C.).

IS IT MANDATORY TO RESPOND TO THE AIES?

Yes. Response is required by law. Title 13, United States Code. Sections 131 and 182 authorize the survey and require businesses and other organizations to respond.

Which surveys are being integrated into the AIES?

- Annual Capital Expenditures Survey
- Annual Retail Trade Survey (ARTS)
- Annual Survey of Manufactures (ASM)
- Annual Wholesale Trade Survey (AWTS)
- Manufacturers' Unfilled Orders Survey
- Report of Organization (COS)
- Service Annual Survey (SAS)

What information is collected in the AIES?

- Various trade or industry-specific content
