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





- Executive Order 12866 on Regulatory Planning and Review

- to ensure policies have validity and integrity.
- to ensure policies reflect the best available evidence.
- to inform and prepare the public.





Usefulness	Collecting the right data for equity analysis and monitoring and enforcing civil rights laws
Quality	Respondents understand the question and are able and willing to provide the requested information
Flexibility	Allowing agencies to collect data specific to their programs, and to modify questions over time or across circumstances
Consistency	Ensuring data across Government is comparable
Identity	Providing response options that reflect how people think of themselves
Efficiency	Minimizing burden to respondents and space on forms; Collecting data only when its value justifies its cost
Feasibility	Designing an approach that works for every Federal agency and program
Continuity	Maintaining trends and also being aware of existing statutory language and judicial precedent

Purpose of SPD 15

SPD 15: Race and Ethnicity Standards

- 1977 = Established;1997 = only previous revision
- New responsibilities to enforce civil rights laws
- Improve the quality, usefulness, and consistency of Federal data on race and ethnicity
- Provide common language to promote uniformity, comparability, and consistency across Federal information collections

Purpose for 2024 Review and Revision

- Declining data quality for Hispanic and Latino respondents
- Middle Eastern and North African respondents view their identity as distinct from White racial category
- Need for disaggregated data to better understand within-group disparities and outcomes
- Inconsistent and outdated terminology



Interagency Technical Working Group on Race and Ethnicity Standards

The Chief Statistician of the United States, positioned in OMB, convened the Interagency Technical Working Group on Race and Ethnicity Standards (Working Group) in 2022

- Chaired by OMB and Co-Chaired by U.S. Census Bureau
- Composed of Federal career staff representing programs that collect or use race and ethnicity data from

across the Federal Government, consistent with OMB's established process

• Provided a set of recommendations to the U.S. Chief Statistician, report is on spd15revision.gov

The Working Group relied heavily on:

- Research conducted by Federal agencies over the last decade
- New research and testing of potential alternatives by several Federal agencies
- Robust public comment in response to a January 2023 FRN (over 20,000 comments), 94 listening sessions, 3 public virtual townhalls, and 1 tribal consultation





Public Outreach and Engagement

Relied on a variety of outreach and communication efforts, and offered diverse ways for the people to engage

1. Collect Race and Ethnicity Information Using One Combined Question

- The 1997 standards required two questions: a Hispanic or Latino ethnicity question and a separate race question.
- 2024 Update: A combined race and ethnicity question is required for both self-response and proxy reporting. Respondents can select multiple categories, but a single response is also considered a complete response.

2. Add Middle Eastern or North African as a New Minimum Category

- The 1997 standards defined people of Middle Eastern or North African (MENA) origin as a group within the White racial category.
- 2024 Update: MENA is a new minimum reporting category distinct from all other reporting categories. The definition for the White category is revised to remove references to MENA.

3. Require the Collection of Detailed Race and Ethnicity Categories as a Default

- The minimum race and ethnicity categories are broad and can contain heterogenous groups. The 1997 standards encouraged the collection of detailed data, but not did require it.
- 2024 Update: The updated SPD 15 requires the collection of detailed data on race and ethnicity beyond the minimum categories, unless an agency determines that the potential benefit of the detailed data would not justify the additional burden to the agency and the public or the additional risk to privacy or confidentiality; and, therefore, requests an exemption from the Office of Information and Regulatory Affairs (OMB). In those cases, Federal agencies must at least use the minimum categories and justify this determination in the agency's Paperwork Reduction Act (PRA) information collection review package.

Additional Revisions Include:

- Updates to terminology, definitions, and question instruction wording.
- Guidance on data collection and editing procedures and presentation of race and ethnicity data.

Implementation and Next Steps Agency Action Plans

Chief Financial Officers (CFO) Act Agencies and the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission must:

- Submit to OMB an Action Plan on Race and Ethnicity Data by or before September 28, 2025 (within 18 months of March 28, 2024)
- Make these plans publicly available through their websites at the time of their submission to OMB

Action Plans must:

- Be submitted through their agency Statistical Official and in coordination with their agency Chief Data Officer, Evaluation Officer, Senior Agency Officials for Privacy, and other agency officials as appropriate
- Describe how an agency intends to bring their collections and publications into compliance by or before March 28, 2029

Agencies should NOT wait
until their Action Plans are submitted
to begin collecting data under
the updated standards



Implementation and Next Steps PRA Clearance

The updated SPD 15 is **effective as of March 28, 2024 Agencies should begin collecting data under the updated standards as soon as possible**No later than March 28, 2029 (five years from published revisions)

- Any new collections submitted as of March 28, 2024 for OMB review under the PRA are expected to follow the updated standards
- To bring existing agency information collections into compliance with the updated standards, agencies must pursue one of two options by or before March 28, 2029:
 - 1. If the *only* change to an existing collection is to update the race and ethnicity question, agencies can submit a **non-substantive change request** modifying the collection
 - 2. Otherwise, any race and ethnicity data collection must be updated as part of its regular extension or revision request

Implementation and Next Steps PRA Clearance

We recognize that collections that ...

- rely on third-party data collectors like schools, hospitals, or local governments or
- involve coordination across multiple Federal agencies

... may require additional planning to adopt the updated standards

This will be taken into consideration when information collections are submitted for OMB review under the PRA when bringing these Federal Government collections into compliance by March 28, 2029



Interagency Committee on Race and Ethnicity Statistical Standards

- Develop, maintain, and carry out a Government-wide research agenda that will include several
 topics that were raised by this review
- Undertake regular reviews of SPD 15 that will
 - Take place on a 10-year cycle
 - Include opportunity for public input

The Interagency Committee will also maintain publicly available Bridging Programs
