- We cannot publicly release your responses in any way that could identify you.



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Why is my participation important?

By filling out the ACS, you represent your community.

Your response helps:

- Provide government, community, and business leaders with critical information about your community.
- Local and state agencies plan for community growth and services such as hospitals, transportation needs, emergency services, and much more.



How is my information collected?

You can respond to the ACS by internet, mail, a personal visit, or a phone call from a U.S. Census Bureau interviewer.



You may have received a letter that provided instructions to access and complete the survey online.

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If you do not complete the survey online, we will send a paper questionnaire about 2 weeks later.

If we receive an incomplete survey or no response is received, a Census Bureau interviewer may contact you by a personal visit or phone.

Why does the ACS ask for detailed information?

- The ACS is the most reliable and diverse public source of data about your community big or small.
- Federal agencies have statutory and regulatory needs to use ACS data for planning purposes.
- Detailed information helps inform how trillions of dollars in federal funds are distributed each year.
