### A Vital Resource for Manufacturing and Trade Statistics

## What is the Manufacturing and Trade Inventories and Sales (MTIS)?

The Manufacturing and Trade Inventories and Sales (MTIS) report provides broad and timely measures of combined changes in domestic retail trade, wholesale trade, and manufacturers' activities.

Estimates in this report are based on data from three surveys:

- Manufacturers' Shipments, Inventories, and Orders Survey (M3)
- Monthly Wholesale Trade Survey (MWTS)
- Monthly Retail Trade Survey (MRTS)

## What value does the Manufacturing and Trade Inventories and Sales report provide?

- An up-to-date indication of trends for sales and inventories of combined retail trade, wholesale trade, and manufacturers' activities.
- Reliable measure of current economic activity that is essential to an objective assessment of a wide range of public policy decisions.
- Corporate economists, trade associations, news media, academia, investment consultants, and researchers use MTIS data for analysis and forecasting of future economic conditions.
- Manufacturers can use inventories estimates as a proxy for distributors' confidence for future expected sales.

#### What data items are included?

- Sales
- Inventories
- Inventories/sales ratios
- Measures of sampling variability
- Seasonally adjusted and not adjusted data

#### What is covered in the MTIS?

The MTIS covers:

- Manufacturing (NAICS Sectors 31-33)
- Wholesale Trade (NAICS Sector 42), including merchant wholesalers but excluding manufacturers' sales branches and offices (or MSBOs) and agents and brokers.
- Retail Trade (NAICS Sectors 44-45)

#### What geographic levels are provided?

Data are provided at the national level.

## How frequently is it conducted and released?

The MTIS is conducted monthly. The MTIS is released online, approximately 6 weeks after the close of the data month.

## Is respondent information kept confidential?


Title 13, United States Code, Section 9 requires the Census Bureau to keep respondent information confidential and to use responses only to produce statistics.
