Background

- Establishment survey forms are complex
- Respondents don't attend to instructions
- NASS cognitive testing found respondents assert they have read instructions but they do not adhere to them
- Lack of consistent formatting of instructions and definitions





Instruction Formatting

Single Banked:

- Fill in the columns below for all aquaculture raised on this operation in 2017. Report aquatic plants in SECTION 11.
 Include the value of your landlord's share, marketing charges, taxes, hauling, etc.

 - Include all sizes for each type.
 Include rood size, ingerlings, fry, and eggs.



Research Questions

- Are respondents more likely to fully attend to the include and exclude statements when they are presented single or double banked?
- Are respondents more likely to attend to definitions when they precede the survey question or when they follow the survey question?





Methods

- Tracking was conducted with Tobii software
- 40 participants took part in the study
- 20 were identified as tracking well (<.80)
- Median Fixation Duration
- Median Fixation Count
- Gaze plots and heat maps






Results: Include/Exclude Statements

Exclude Statements Fixation Duration and Fixation Count

Double-Banked (n=7)	0.50	2.00					






Single Banked Include/Exclude Statements

Definition After (n=5)	1.8	14







Conclusions

- Include and exclude statements are more attended to when they are single-banked.
- Definitions are more attended to when they precede the survey question.





Limitations

- Problems with tracking
- Problems with precision
- Problems with design
