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Preliminary: U.S. Imports for Consumption of Steel Products October 2013

The U.S. Census Bureau announced today that preliminary October steel imports were **\$2.6 billion (2.8 million metric tons)** compared to the preliminary September totals of \$2.3 billion (2.5 million metric tons).

The October change in steel imports based on metric tonnage reflected increases primarily in blooms, billets and slabs and oil country goods. Decreases occurred primarily in hot rolled sheets and reinforcing bars. Increases occurred primarily with Russia and Korea. Decreases occurred primarily with Japan, Turkey, and Netherlands.

The year to date final statistics through September 2013 showed steel imports of 21.7 million metric tons compared with 23.3 million metric tons through September 2012. The largest commodity decreases occurred primarily in blooms, billets and slabs; oil country goods; and plates cut lengths. Increases occurred primarily in hot rolled bars, reinforcing bars, and hot rolled sheets. The largest country decreases occurred primarily with Russia and Canada. Increases occurred primarily with Mexico and China.

Notes:

The data in this report are preliminary and subject to revisions.

Analysis of recent months for steel product imports indicates the value of preliminary data should equal about 96 percent of the final value reported in the regular monthly trade statistics report. Preliminary data reported for individual steel categories and at the individual country of origin level have been less consistently predictive of the final data reported in the regular monthly trade statistics.
