ACS 1-Year Estimates

- All geographic areas of 65,000 total population or more across the U.S.
 - The Nation
 - Every State, the District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico
 - Every Congressional District
 - Approximately 25 percent of all counties
- Approximately 7,000 geographic areas each receive over 1,200 tables



2010 Census and ACS

- 2010 Census
 - Full count of our country every 10 years
 - A snapshot as of April 1
 - Population counts
- American Community Survey
 - A continuous sample survey
 - Collects data on a wider variety of subjects
 - Produces estimates every year

Comparing ACS Data	Generally, you can compare American Community Survey (ACS) 1-year estimates with Census 2000 and other ACS 1-year data. However, since ACS variables change over time, some areas and subjects must be compared with caution, or not compared at all.	Frequently Asked Questie Site Map Website Feedback					
2009	Comparing American Community Survey 3-year and 5-year data with other data						
2008 2007 2006	Generally, you can compare American Community Survey (ACS) 3-year and 5-year estimates with Census 2000 data. There are differences in the universe , question wording , residence rules , reference periods , and the way in which the data are tabulated which can impact comparability.

Training Presentations	Additional guidance is available for comparing 2005-2009 ACS 5-year estimates to Census 2000 data. For an overview, use the <u>quick</u> guide, to compare by subject browse the <u>subject/topic comparison chart</u> , or use the <u>table comparison tool</u> to search by table number.						
E-Tutorial	General Guidance for comparing ACS multiyear estimates						
	 When comparing estimates for different areas, use the same period length for each estimate. This means you should not compare a 1-year estimate to a 3-year estimate. 						
	 The Census Bureau discourages direct comparisons between estimates for overlapping periods. Instead, compare nonoverlapping estimates. This means we discourage you from comparing the 2005-2007 ACS estimates to the 2006-2008 ACS estimates. It is better for you to compare a 2005-2007 ACS estimate to a 2008-2010 ACS estimate. 						
	The strength of the ACS is in estimating characteristic distributions. We recommend users compare derived measures such as percents, means, medians, and rates rather than estimates of population totals.

New Data Products

- 12 New Detailed Tables:
 - 9 housing
 - 2 fertility
 - 1 place of birth
- 4 New Ranking Tables
- 2 New Geographic Comparison Tables



Data Product Changes

- About 200 modified tables
 - Updates to reflect changes to 2010 Standard
 Occupational Classification
 - Changes to universe descriptions to match descriptions in 2010 Census
 - Changes to names of health insurance coverage categories
- Deleted 1 state ranking table and geographic comparison table

Comparison Guidance

- Compare across geographies and population subgroups using 2010 ACS
- Be careful comparing across data sets
 - Don't expect 2010 ACS estimates to equal 2010 Census counts
 - Differences in controls and geography may impact comparisons between 2009 and 2010 ACS estimates
 - Fluctuations in groups quarters population may impact substate comparisons over time
 - Use caution comparing occupation over time

Commuting and the ACS


- The ACS questions related to transportation focus solely on commuting, or the trip to work
- Commuting data are now collected using the ACS




How Do People Get to Work? (Transportation Mode)

- The percentage of workers 16 years and over who <u>drove alone</u> to work increased from 76.1 percent in 2009 to 76.6 percent in 2010
- The percentage who <u>carpooled</u> decreased from 10.0 percent in 2009 to 9.7 percent in 2010
- The percentage who took <u>public transportation</u> decreased from 5.0 percent to 4.9 percent






Percentage of Workers Who Commuted by Public Transportation by Metropolitan Statistical Area: 2009



Means of Transportation and Nativity


- In 2009, the foreign-born population carpooled at a rate of 16 percent, compared with 9.4 percent for the native-born population
- Public transportation usage among the foreignborn was 10.8 percent in 2009, more than twice that of the native-born population, at 4.1 percent
- 2010 saw a similar relative distribution of travel modes across these groups






Where do People Work?

- In 2010, most workers worked in the same county as their residence (72.6 percent)
- The states with the highest rate of workers who worked outside their county of residence in 2010 were Virginia (51.3), Maryland (47.0), and New Jersey (45.7 percent)



Foreign Born from Latin America and the Caribbean

- 12.9% of the population were foreign born
- 53% of the foreign born were from Latin America
- 29% of all foreign born were from Mexico
- Foreign born were concentrated in California, Texas, Florida and New York





Employment/Population Ratios for the 50 Largest Metropolitan Statistical Areas

- Employment/population ratio declined by 1.6 percentage points from 2009 to 2010
- Decline was smaller than 3.3 percentage point decline from 2008 to 2009
- 43 of the 50 largest MSAs saw a decline in their employment/population ratio from 2009 to 2010



Health Insurance Coverage of Workers Aged 18 to 64, by Work Experience

- Massachusetts had among highest rates of employer-based health insurance coverage
- New Mexico had among lowest rates of employerbased health insurance coverage



Household Income for States

- Real median household income fell 2.2% from 2009 (\$51,190) to 2010 (\$50,046)
- No state showed an increase in median household income
- Real median household income decreased in 35 states
