Native born – Anyone who is a U.S. citizen at birth


- Born in the United States
- Born in Puerto Rico
- Born abroad in a U.S. Island Area (e.g., Guam)
- Born abroad of U.S. citizen parent(s)

Foreign born – Anyone who is not a U.S. citizen at birth

- Naturalized U.S. citizens
- Legal permanent residents
- Temporary migrants
- Humanitarian migrants
- Unauthorized migrants



Foreign-Born Population and Percentage of Total Population: 1850 to 2010






Foreign-Born Population by State: 2010

(Percent distribution)









Foreign-Born Population as Percent of State Population: 2010




Foreign-Born Population by World Region of Birth: 2010






Foreign-Born Population by Country of Birth: 2010






Percentage of the Foreign-Born Population Who Came to Live in the United States in 2000 or Later by Region of Birth: 2010






Percentage of the Foreign-Born Population Who Are Naturalized U.S. Citizens by Region of Birth: 2010





Percentage of the Population Who Are Married by Nativity Status and Region of Birth: 2010




Fertility by Nativity Status and Region of Birth: 2009-2010

(Based on women aged 15 to 50 years)






Average Household Size by Nativity Status and Region of Birth: 2010






Percentage of Households That Were Family Households by Nativity Status and Region of Birth: 2010






Percentage of Households That Were Married-Couple Households by Nativity Status and Region of Birth: 2010






Percentage of Family Households With Children Under 18 by Nativity Status and Region of Birth: 2010






Percentage of Family Households With Three or More Generations by Nativity Status and Region of Birth: 2010

(Population 5 years and over)



Percentage of the Population With a High School Degree or Higher Education by Nativity Status and Region of Birth: 2010



Percentage of the Population in the Labor Force by Nativity Status and Region of Birth: 2010



(Civilian employed population 16 years and over)



Median Household Income in the Past 12 Months by Nativity Status and Region of Birth of Householder: 2010



Percentage of the Population With Health Insurance Coverage by Nativity Status and Region of Birth: 2010



INTRODUCTION This report presents a portrait of the foreign-born population in the United States. The U.S. Census Bureau uses the term foreign born to refer to anyone who is not a U.S. clitizen at birth. This includes naturalized clitizens, lawful permanent residents, temporary migrants (such as foreign students), humanitarian migrants (such as refugees), and undocumented migrants. A household is a person or a group of people who occupy a housing unit as their current residence. College residence halls, military barracks, correctional facilities, and other group quarters are not included. A householder is usually the person, or one of the people, in whose name the home is owned, being bought, or rented. A family household consists of a householder and one or more people living together in the same household who are related to the householder by birth, marriage, or adoption. It may also include people unrelated to the householder. The nativity status and place of birth of a household are determined by the nativity status and place of birth of the householder.
