2011 ACS Release Schedule

2011 1-Year Estimates (Geographic Areas of 65,000+)

- Tuesday, September 18: Embargo Release
- Thursday, September 20: Public Release

2009-2011 3-Year Estimates (Geographic Areas of 20,000+)

2011 ACS PUMS Release Schedule

- Public Use Microdata Sample (PUMS) files contain individual housing unit and person records with limited geography to ensure confidentiality
- 2011 1-Year PUMS file: October 25
- 2009-2011 3-Year PUMS file: December 6
- 2007-2011 5-Year PUMS file: January, 2013

Basics: The Survey

- Fully implemented in 2005
- Ongoing survey that samples over 3.5 million addresses per year
- Collects data on a wide range of demographic, social, economic, and housing characteristics
- Multiple data collection modes
- Internet option beginning 2013
- Publishes annual estimates for small geographic areas and population groups

Basics: The Estimates

- Describe the average characteristics over a specific period of time
 - 1 year (12 months)
 - 3 years (36 months)
 - 5 years (60 months)
- Do not represent a single point in time
- 5-year estimates are NOT an average of five 1-year estimates

Basics: The Estimates

- 5-year estimates cover period from Jan. 1, 2007 to Dec. 31, 2011
- Geographic boundaries as of Jan. 1, 2011
- Dollar values inflation adjusted to 2011 dollars
- Over 11 billion characteristic estimates
- Over 700,000 unique geographic areas
- Estimates published at census tract and block group level

 - Fewer Detailed Tables
 - No Ranking Tables
 - No Comparison Profiles
 - No Selected Population Profiles
 - No Narrative Profiles
- Contains Fewer Topics
 - No Health Insurance Coverage (2008-2012)
 - No Disability Status (2008-2012)
 - No Marital History (2008-2012)
 - No Field of Bachelor's Degree (2009-2013)



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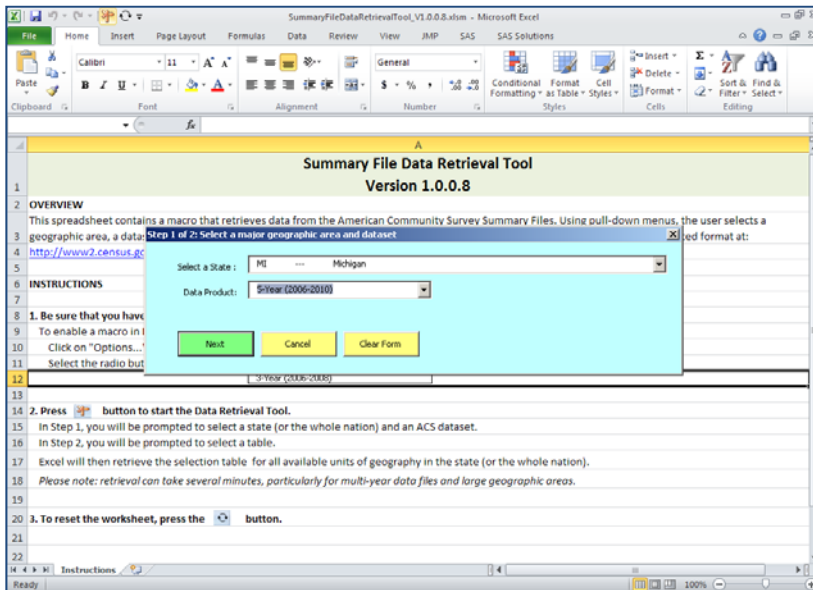

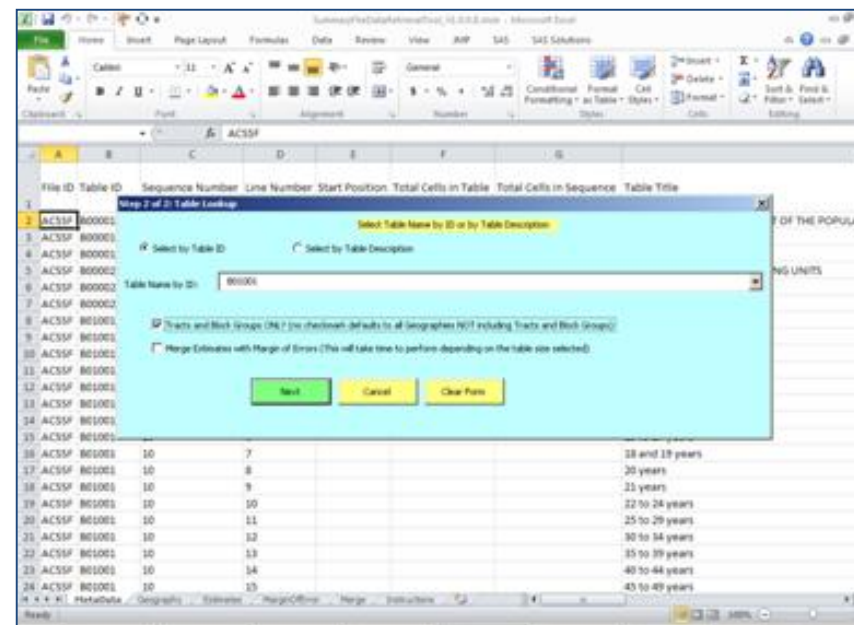

5-Year Data Product Changes

- 6 New Tables Providing Additional Detail:
 - 4 migration
 - 2 commuting
- 2 New Detailed Tables Providing New Content:
 - 1 commuting
 - B08604
 - 1 employment
 - B23025
- S1601 “Language Spoken at Home” modified to include information on language spoken at home for citizens 18 years and over
- All tables, except block group tables, available on AFF

Methodological Improvements

- ACS made a number of methodological changes in 2011 to improve estimate accuracy and reliability
 - Expanded the sample from about 2.9 million addresses to 3.54 million addresses
 - Increased personal visit follow up sampling rates in select American Indian areas, Alaska Native Village Statistical areas, Hawaiian Home Lands, and remote Alaska
 - Reallocated sample from larger to smaller Census tracts
 - Changed group quarters (GQ) estimation methodology to improve sub-state estimates of the GQ population and its characteristics

ZIP Code Tabulation Areas (ZCTAs)

- ZCTAs are approximate area representations of ZIP Code service areas
- The most frequently occurring ZIP Code for addresses in an area is the ZCTA code
- Some ZIP Codes represent very few addresses (sometimes only one) and therefore will not appear in the ZCTA universe

Comparison Guidance

- Compare across geographies and population subgroups
- Be careful comparing across data sets
 - Do not compare 2007-2011 ACS 5-year estimates to 2006-2010 ACS 5-year estimates
 - Do not mix 1-year, 3-year, and 5-year estimates when making comparisons
- Compare percents, means, medians, and rates instead of totals whenever possible
- Don't expect ACS estimates to match decennial Census counts or estimates from other surveys

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Comparing ACS Data

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The strength of the American Community Survey is in estimating characteristic distributions. We recommend users compare derived measures such as percents, means, medians, and rates rather than estimates of population totals.

Can I compare...?

- American Community Survey 1-Year estimates with other data ?**
 - ✓ ACS 1-year estimates with Census 2000
 - ✓ ACS 1-year estimates from different years.

⚠ Use Caution: Because ACS variables change over time, some areas and subjects must be **compared with caution**, or **not compared at all**.

Use the **left navigation** to get yearly guidance on specific topics/subjects.
